My name is Alex and I decided to join the Devon & Cornwall Community Scrutiny Panel (DCCSP), with the purpose of creating, strengthening and maintaining a healthy relationship between the community and law enforcement. With the current racial tensions happening in the United States of America, it's easier to judge and become complacent of our allies across the pond, as opposed to drawing parallels and highlighting the same issues within the United Kingdom.

According to the statistics provided by STOPWATCH, which extrapolates its data from stop & search figures provided by

the Devon & Cornwall police, black people are 8.4 times more likely than white people to be targeted for a stop & search in 2018/19. This is a surprising statistic as according to the devon.gov.uk website, the percentage of Black, Asian, and minority ethnicity (BAME) people is estimated to be around 10% as of 2017.

This is not to say that racial profiling is the only issue that will be dealt with by the DCCSP. I understand that a lot of issues also revolve around the fact that most stop & searches occur within lower income areas, and therefore there are a lot more variables that will be taken into account over the course of what the DCCSP intends to do.

The DCCSP aims to look over body camera footage of officers during stop & search procedures, and will aim to objectively scrutinise it in accordance to the legal standard and procedure.
